

Anne Talks About the Mountain of Holiness  
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Anne's second presentation was about what she calls the Mountain of Holiness:

I have been given a vision of the mountain of holiness from a hundred years ago. People were helping and encouraging each other; everyone pulled each other up.

Then I saw the mountain today, and it was very different. People were climbing toward holiness, but they were scared and isolated, without fellowship. There was no general spirit of obedience, but they were tough and hearty.

Toward the top of the mountain, I would see them lean back to rest, but they would not fall back down the mountain. Something was supporting their backs. It was their individual obedience that kept them from falling back, their obedience to our Church.

They were saints; they weren't at risk of falling, of back-sliding, because of their obedience.

What about those who are obedient to the Church but they are really mean? Those who make sure they are following the rules and make sure that everybody knows it. What about them?

At the base of the mountain, I saw a line of demarcation, which is a ring of defiance. In that ring there were people standing on the mountain, dressed for climbing, but they are there to be seen. They repel others and put people off the Church. They considered themselves holy but considered others weren't; they were welcome on the mountain, but thought others weren't.

Jesus showed me that this was a time of emergency on the mountain of holiness -- people were being lost, and angels were carrying people over the ring of defiance and putting them on the mountain.

Outside the ring of defiance, I saw two other groups of people. One group had been hurt by God's Church. Someone representing the Church had hurt them, and they were wounded. The second group had not been hurt by the Church, but they were using the pain of the first group to keep themselves from serving the Church. The second group will be tougher to convert. The first group will return; the second is using the first as an excuse.
